

Known for her ability to connect with young patients, Alyssa consistently goes the extra mile to ease their fears during visits. She believes that a few extra minutes spent meeting a child's emotional and sensory needs can transform the experience for both families and providers.

Her dedication to creating more supportive care environments extends beyond the exam room. Alyssa previously secured multiple grants to expand autism awareness and sensory-friendly resources in healthcare, resulting in the creation of sensory rooms and the distribution of more than 30 sensory boxes across urgent care, ER and outpatient clinics. She also developed an online tool for staff training and onboarding – a project she later shared nationally as a speaker at the American Association of Nurse Practitioners (AANP) conference.

In addition to AANP, Alyssa is an active member of the Coalition of Advanced Practice Registered Nurses of Indiana. She earned both her associate and bachelor's degrees in nursing from Indiana University and her Master of Science in Nursing from Indiana State University in Terre Haute, where she was inducted into the Sigma Tau Theta National Honor Society for Nurses.
